


Can academic research improve policing practices and policies? A conversation

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE PRESENT

- Up to 1980s strong diversity of crimino-sociological research about policing
- Evidence-based Policing (EBP) dominates current thinking in England and Wales – focus on the police
- Police and crime science underpin police education
- > Research funding is ring fenced to EBP partnerships and research agendas
- > This has become institutionalised College of Policing





What is 'Evidence' based policing in the UK?



EVIDENCE BASED POLICING IN ENGLAND & WALES

- Not police evidence! Based on evidence-based medicine / experimental criminology
- Purist and realist versions of EBP
- > Believe that robust, scientific knowledge can:
 - Discover facts and truths about policing;
 - Prove **'what works'** for policing;
 - **Implementing** this knowledge in strategic and operational decisions as a matter of policy can 'improve policing'.





What makes EBP so strong in Anglo-saxon countries?



EBP GLOBAL STORYLINES EVIDENCE-BASED POLICING (EBP) IS THE ANSWER...

- Simplified narratives for cops, politicians, policy makers, researchers, (prac)ademics
- Sold by authoritative voices professors at University of Cambridge and senior police officers
- EBP offers simple answers to wicked problems backed by science and evidence!
- > **Supported** by growing global army of practitioners Societies of EBP
- EBP has become institutionalised and industrialised in the UK, US, Canada, Australia, NZ
- EBP aligns with political story-lines





What can we learn from your critical analysis?





CAN EBP BE HARMFUL?

- > **Do we need EBP?** Problematises 'improved' and 'more professional' policing?
- Hierarchy of knowledge but what is evidence and whose counts?
- Not the neutral science-based improvement project EBP supports particular statist political ideas about 'improved policing'
- Focuses on managerial interests efficiency, effectiveness, professionalism conservative 'asks' of policing
- > How and **for whom** does EBP envisage 'improving policing'?
- Policing as its own academic discipline or a rendezvous point for various approaches?
- Institutionalising EBP controls access to funding, data and governing research agendas and questions – squeezes other (critical) voices

REFLEXIVE POLICING AS A FRAMEWORK... SOME PRINCIPLES

- 1. Bold and **shared** public vision
- 2. **Respect** for wider-ranging epistemologies
- 3. Independent development of research agendas
- 4. Separate policing and academia
- 5. Equalised and democratised access to police data



REFLEXIVE POLICING AS A FRAMEWORK... SOME PRINCIPLES

- 6. A **revised** model of research funding
- 7. Make knowledge on policing more accessible
- 8. Developing policing knowledge change champions
- 9. **Dissemination** of a non-judgemental, diverse knowledge base
- 10. Alternative police education programmes
